SUSR BACKGROUND

Create a single review process where a multi-agency approach is required, incorporating the following review processes Adult Practice Review; Child Practice Review; Domestic Homicide Review; Mental Health Homicide Review; Offensive Weapon Homicide Review. The final report is then used to inform professional practice via the Wales Safeguarding Repository.

SUSR TRAINING PROGRAMME UPDATE

- Face to face training package developed for Chairs, Reviewers and Panel members, with supplementary e-Learning in development for Panel members.
- First pilot sessions for Chairs, Reviewers and Panel members to be delivered in February with full training scheduled for delivery from April to September.
- Monitoring and evaluation system being developed to track effectiveness of training
- Training Steering Group members working to strengthen CSP links within training development and delivery.

PROGRESS TO DATE

- The Approved Chairs and Reviewers list is now being populated with the first tranche of nominations.
- Please continue to send nominations in to ensure they are identified for the SUSR training round in February.

WALES SAFEGUARDING REPOSITORY UPDATE

- Following two rounds of in-person user testing, a further phase of testing on-line will be undertaken. Please contact SUSRWales@gov.wales if you are interested in taking part.
- We will be preparing the WSR User Registration process in the New Year ready to test alongside the next testing phase.

VICTIM AND FAMILY REFERENCE GROUP

- The Victim and Family Reference Group met on the 30th November to progress the Engagement Plan. Comments are due back on the initial draft by 18th December after which a revised version will be produced for further consideration.

NEXT STEPS

- We are diarising monthly briefings with the RSB Business Managers and CSP managers in readiness for transitioning to implementation.
